
All library books must be returned to the school library by Thursday, May 24.

High School

Algebra II is working on mastering functions and some practical applications (called word problems) and learning how to apply computation tools to solve them. We are taking time to review and gain understanding. Advanced Math is likewise reviewing basic concepts of statistics and probability, as well as working with graphing complex numbers on a polar coordinate system.

Chemistry is working on calculating the amount of heat energy required to change elements from solid to liquid to gaseous states.

Speech class gave their "advice for a successful life" speeches this week and will work on trying to summarize the year in their final presentations.
